1. **The Principal's Report (2 pages)-** Highlights the key activities, events, and successes of the past year and briefly describes major new initiatives to be undertaken over the next year.

Highlights

1. College was selected for grant of Rs.2.0 Crore from RUSA FOR Civil Work, Renovation and Equipments.
2. Institutional Development Plan for World Bank Project was submitted finally.
3. N.C.C.Officer (Army) Dr.Devendra Singh Gurjar was conferred Best N.C.C.Officer Award by Group Commander,NCC,Gwalior. 2 Cadets Kapil Mahor and Vikas Singh Tomar attnded RDC Camp.
4. College Received Best College Award 15 M.P.Batalion NCC.
5. Some of our students played at State level in Football, Basketball, Tennis and Handball (all Male category) and one girl student Bharti Rathore represented in Football (Female Category) at State level.

6. Twenty teachers participated in National Conferences/Seminars and International Seminar in different subjects during 2018-19.
7. Some of our teachers served during 2018-19 as Chairman/members of Board of Studies in different subjects in Jiwaji University, Gwalior. Dept of Higher Education appointed Two teachers in Central Board of Studies in Economics and Sociology for framing syllabus for Undergraduate Classes.
8. Eight teachers got their 18 research papers published in Reputed and recognised National and International journals.
9. Eight research scholars got Doctorate Degree (Ph.D.) under the able guidance of Research Supervisors of this college.
10. Grant from State Government was received for I.T. enabled class and was used accordingly.
11. Some teachers assisted Professional Examination Board, Bhopal and Madhya Pradesh Public Service Commission, Indore for various examination related matters.
12. One short term training programmes of 30 days duration was organised by Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell. The subject of training was 'Preparation for Open competitive examinations' These were in addition to monthly guidance programmes which covered C.V./Resume, Group Discussion, Placement process etc
13. A career fair was organised in the month of February 2019. Guidance for employment, self employment, army recruitment ,skill development etc was provided. During the process of campus recruitment a total 104 students were selected by companies in the field of I.T. and marketing
14. Twelve sessions were organised by Personality Development Cell during 2018-19. Topics covered a variety of topics related with grooming..
15. National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) Unit organised various programmes on greenery, plantation, AIDS, harmony in community, girl child education, voting awareness ,importance of education etc. Also a 07 days camp was organised by this unit under the guidance of N.S.S. Officer
16. NCC Cadets attended CATC Camp, NSC, T.S.C.Camp, NIC Camp, Army Attachment Camp, All India Tracking Camp, etc.
17. Six Cadets were selected for Soldiers etc in Army, Air Force and Navy. Cadets also contributed for Society to a large scale

18. Entrepreneurship Development Cell of College organised 5 camps of 3 days duration each .These covered guidance from industrialists ,businessmen, bankers, Distt Industry Centre, MSME, .Industrial visits were in addition to these activities.
19. Automation work of Library continued during 2018-19.
19. Book Bank Scheme helped the students. 398 SC/ST students received book and stationery of Rs.1500/= each. Thorough verification of library was made by verification committee.
20. Like in earlier sessions all the schemes of Department of Higher Education were implemented properly during 2018-19 too.
21. A total of 8 training sessions were organised by Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell for Career benefit of students covering various aspects of career.
22. 641 SC students and 01 ST eligible students received scholarship of amount 62,00,912 Rs. during 2018-19. This is excluding OBC students.
23. College successfully organised District level and Divisional level Kabaddi Tournament during 2018-19.
24. Our students participated at State level in the events of Kabaddi,Kho-Kho, Football (Girls) and at National Level in Cross Country and Table Tennis.

College Chalo Abhiyan - The schools of city and nearby villages were informed through pamphlets. Meetings with principals of schools were held in the month of June about the online admission process and the various scheme of Department of Higher Education. Resultantly the admission strength is increased to sufficient level during current session.

Library-The automation of our library is in process. Computer with internet Wi-Fi facility is established in the library. The College is subscribed to INFLIBNET enabling support to learning, research and academic pursuits.

- *It was then started from from a govt school building,Morar,Gwalior . Science Department was inaugurated by Late Sh.Narsingh Rao Dixit,the then Home Minister,State Govt.of MadhyaPradesh.
- * It was shifted to a new building with vast area of more than 8 acre . All the three faculties of Arts,Science and Commerce were in the college.
- *Earlier L.L.B Course was also run by the college, but from 1998 the posts were transferred to Govt. M.L.B. College, Gwalior. From then L.L.B. Course is not operational.
- * It was accredited by NAAC in 2009 with A Grade and again in 2017 by B+ Grade.
- *NAAC inspection (I Cycle) was made in October 2008 and Grade B was accorded.
- * PGDCA course was started in 2015-16on self finance basis.
- * NAAC inspection (II Cycle) was made in December 2016 and Grade B + was accorded.

- * College was selected for some activities by World Bank Project.

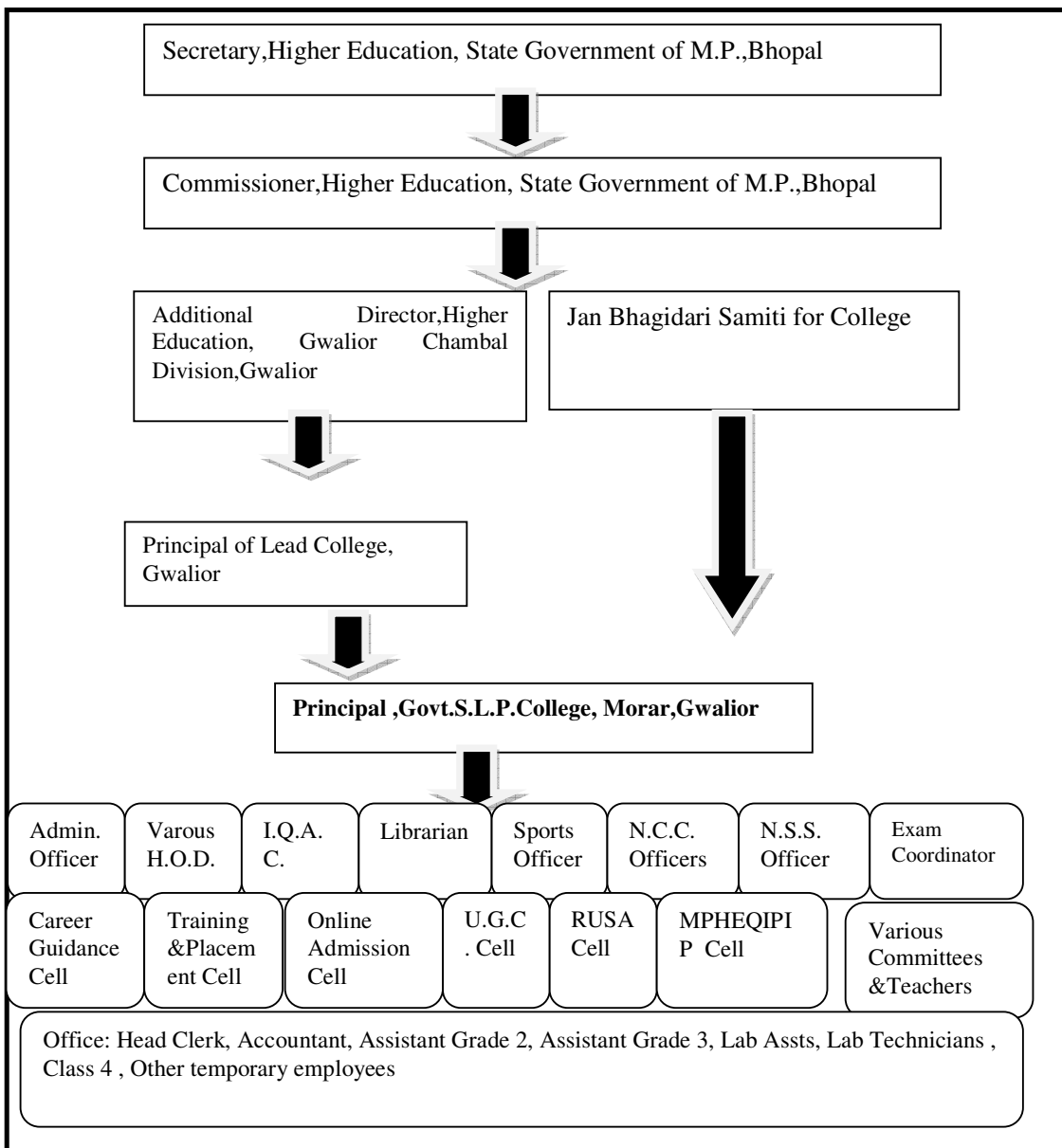

- **Library as a learning resource- advisory committee, its composition, facilities & services (e & print), annual improvement initiatives**

College has a Central Library. It has 45672 books. 5 magazines are 5 journals are subscribed by it. Book Bank scheme is run under Library. Full time librarian and a book lifter is posted here. Purchase and Development Committee ,comprising of 4 Senior Professors , looks after the related matters. Under the scheme 'Book Bank' a total 940 SC/ST students got benefit of having books/stationery of Rs.1500/= during 2018-19. Every Saturday 'PRASHNMANCH' (Quiz) was organised for students by Librarian. Every day a Quotation is written by Librarian on Display Board to motivate the students. Automation work of library was carried out in library. This is continued in present session as well. Book Reading Club(comprising of good students) was also active throughout 2018-19. Soul2.0 Software and INFLIBNET is used for library. We expect, more books and journals, more magazines subscription during 2018-19. However due to space constrain and increasing number of students, we have planned to demand for Barcode facility and expansion of library building. More books, magazines and journals are needed. Automation is expected to finish during ongoing session of 2019-20.

05. Some of our NCC cadets attended camp of CATC, TSC, NIC, AAC. All India Tracking Camps. Our NCC Officer Dr. D.S. Gurjar was given Best N.C.C. Officer award by the Group Commander. .06 cadets were selected for Army/Navy etc.
06. Entrepreneurship Development Cell of College organised 5 camps of 3 days duration each .These covered guidance from industrialists ,businessmen, bankers, Distt Industry Centre, MSME, .Industrial visits were in addition to these activities.
07. Automation work continued in library.
08. A 10 days duration camp of Self defence Judo Karate was organised for girls by Women Anti Harassment Cell and also 2 lectures of advocates were organised by this cell for girls .These were on legal issues for women especially. .
09. Though mentoring system is not followed in the college, special classes were taken to help weaker students. For slow learners and visually handicapped students concerned subject teachers took extra efforts. In every examination where Visually handicapped students appeared, extra invigilators were provided for their extra room or space. During inter examinations also they were given special attention.
10. Tracking of students was done . This recorded to more than 90 percent for final Year students. This will continue in ongoing session also.

9. Examination committee took care of the examination related issues of students (for private students also).


