**Highlights**

1. N.C.C.Officer (Army) Dr.Devendra Singh Gurjar was conferred Best N.C.C.Officer Award by the Chief Minister of Madhya Pradesh at his residence.
2. Best Physical Award College NCC was conferred upon this college.
- 3.108 Cadets participated in CATC Camps.
4. 24 Cadets took part for C Certificate and 40 Cadets for B Certificate.
5. Some of our students played at State level in Football, Basketball , Khokho,Vollyball,Boxing, Handball (all Male category) and 02 girl students represented in Football (Female Category) and 03 girls for Boxing at State level.

6. Thirty teachers participated in National Conferences/Seminars and International Seminar, Faculty Development Programme in different subjects during 2019-20.
7. Some of our teachers served during 2019-20 as Chairman/members of Board of Studies in different subjects in Jiwaji University, Gwalior. Dept of Higher Education appointed Two teachers in Central Board of Studies in Economics and Sociology for framing syllabus for Undergraduate Classes.
8. Eight teachers got their 21 research papers published in Reputed and recognised National and International journals.
9. Seven research scholars got Doctorate Degree (Ph.D.) under the able guidance of Research Supervisors of this college.
10. Grant from State Government was received for I.T. enabled class and was used accordingly.
11. Some teachers assisted Professional Examination Board, Bhopal and Madhya Pradesh Public Service Commission, Indore for various examination related matters.
12. One short term training programmes of 28 days duration was organised by Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell. The subject of training was 'Preparation for Open competitive examinations' These were in addition to monthly guidance programmes which covered C.V./Resume, Group Discussion, Placement process etc
13. Twelve sessions were organised by Personality Development Cell during 2018-19. Topics covered a variety of topics related with personality grooming
14. National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) Unit organised various programmes on greenery, plantation, AIDS, harmony in community, girl child education, voting awareness importance of education etc. Also a 07 days camp was organised by this unit under the guidance of N.S.S. Officer

21. A total of 8 training sessions were organised by Swami Vivekanand Career Guidance Cell for Career benefit of students covering various aspects of career.
22. 931 SC students and 05 ST eligible students received scholarship of amount 70,50,265 Rs. during 2019-20. This is excluding OBC students.
23. College successfully organised District level and Divisional level Kabaddi Tournament during 2019-20.
24. Our students participated at State level in the events of Kabaddi,Kho-Kho, Football (Girls) and at National Level in Cross Country and Table Tennis.
25. Procurement of Equipments was made from RUSA grants .
26. 5 days Faculty Development Programme was organised by the IQAC of this college from 20-27 July 2020. Total 120 teachers participated in this programme .

**College Chalo Abhiyan** - The schools of city and nearby villages were informed through pamphlets. Meetings with principals of schools were held in the month of June about the online admission process and the various scheme of Department of Higher Education. Resultantly the admission strength is increased to sufficient level during current session.

**Library**-The automation of our library is in process. Computer with internet Wi-Fi facility is established in the library. The College is subscribed to INFLIBNET enabling support to learning, research and academic pursuits.

- \* College was started in the year 1970 in the name of Late Shri Shyam Lal Pandaviya, a veteran freedom fighter and leader.
- \* It was then started from a govt school building, Morar, Gwalior. Science Department was inaugurated by Late Sh. Narsingh Rao Dixit, the then Home Minister, State Govt. of Madhya Pradesh.
- \* It was shifted to a new building with vast area of more than 8 acre. All the three faculties of Arts, Science and Commerce were in the college.
- \* Earlier L.L.B Course was also run by the college, but from 1998 the posts were transferred to Govt. M.L.B. College, Gwalior. From then L.L.B. Course is not operational.
- \* It was accredited by NAAC in 2009 with A Grade and again in 2017 by B+ Grade.
- \* NAAC inspection ( I Cycle) was made in October 2008 and Grade B was accorded.
- \* PGDCA course was started in 2015-16 on self finance basis. Discontinued now.
- \* NAAC inspection ( II Cycle) was made in December 2016 and Grade B + was accorded.
- \* College was granted sanction of Rs.2.0 Crore grant from RUSA.
- \* College was selected for some activities by World Bank Project.
- \* College started B.S.W. Classes with the affiliation of Chitrakoot Gramoday Vishwavidyalaya and instructions from the Govt. of M.P.. 70 students are beneficiaries.

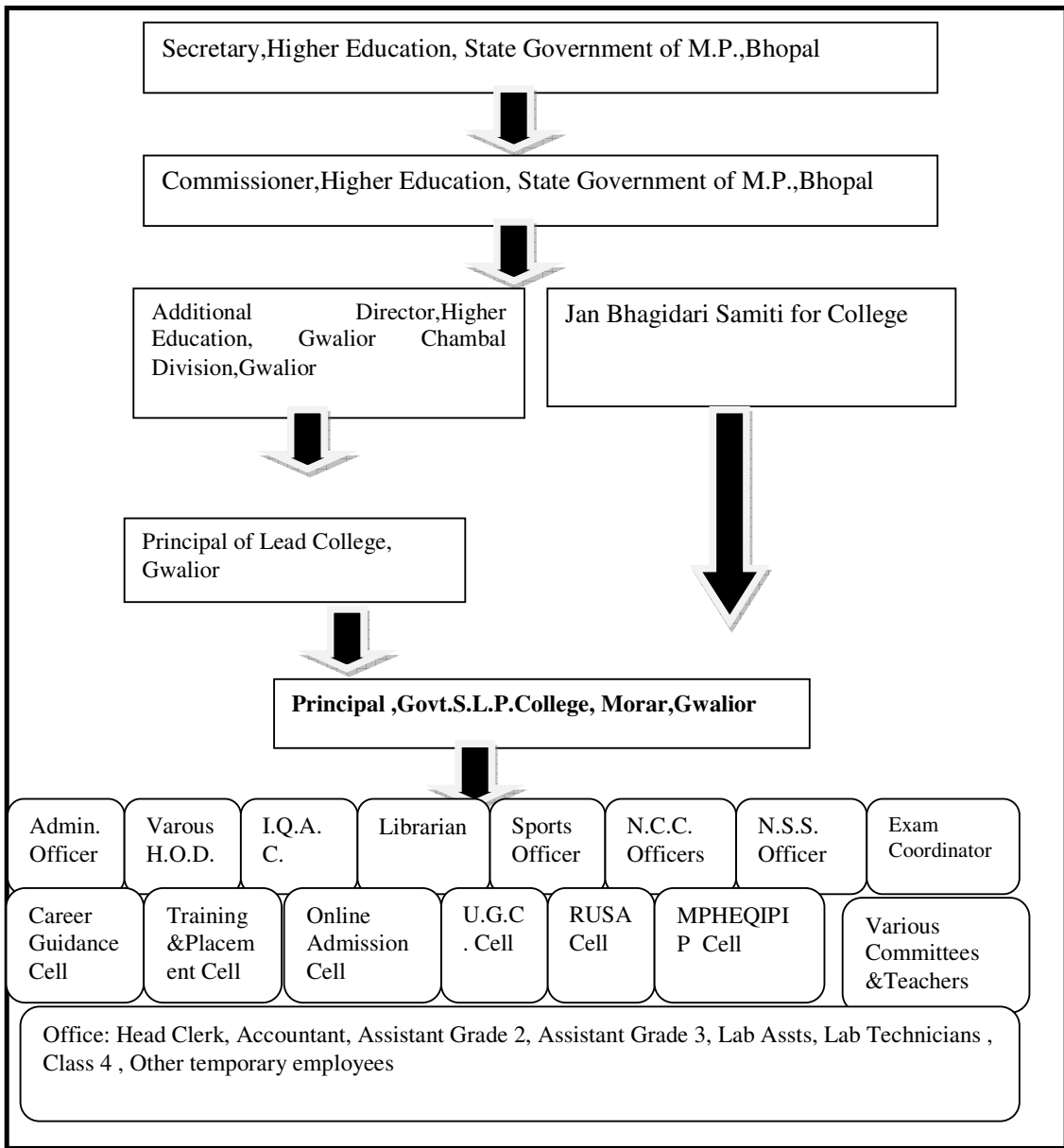

- **Library as a learning resource- advisory committee, its composition,**

College has a Central Library. It has 49702 books. 4 magazines and 6 journals are subscribed by it. Book Bank scheme is run under Library. Full time librarian and a book lifter is posted here. Purchase and Development Committee, comprising of 4 Senior Professors, looks after the related matters. Under the scheme 'Book Bank' a total 1128 SC/ST students got benefit of having books/stationery of Rs.1500/= during 2019-20. Every Saturday 'PRASHNMANCH' (Quiz) was organised for students by Librarian. Every day a Quotation is written by Librarian on Display Board to motivate the students. Automation work of library was carried out in library. This is continued in present session as well. Book Reading Club (comprising of good students) was also active throughout 2019-20. Soul2.0 Software and INFLIBNET is used for library. We expect, more books and journals, more magazines subscription during 2019-20. However due to space constrain and increasing number of students, we have planned to demand for Barcode facility and expansion of library building. More books, magazines and journals are needed. Automation is expected to finish during ongoing session of 2021-22.

Cent percent fee collection for admissions, exam forwarding fee, T.C./C.C. etc is online. A Computer learning programme 'Spoken Tutorials' is being run with the help of IIT, Mumbai. B.Sc.(Computer Science) and B.Com (Computer Science) courses are also run. Smart Classes are used to get them learn better with the help of ICT. We have 3 smart class rooms in our college. Every dept. has facility and access of computers /projectors (some depts..) etc for the benefits of students.


